FY2017 Performance Accountability Report

The Performance Accountability Report (PAR) measures each agency's performance for the fiscal year against the agency's performance plan and includes major accomplishments, updates on initiatives, and key performance indicators (KPIs).

Mission

The District of Columbia Corrections Information Council (CIC) is an independent monitoring body mandated by the US Congress and the DC Council to inspect, monitor, and report on the conditions of confinement at facilities where DC residents are incarcerated.

Summary of Services

FY17 Top Accomplishments

The CIC inspected the only supermax in the Federal Bureau of Prisons (BOP), ADX Florence, with the assistance of corrections psychology expert.	This has improved CIC's relationship with BOP and improved CIC's ability to reach out to DC residents incarcerated in the special administrative facilities.	This is the first time anyone from DC has been able to enter ADX Florence beyond visiting halls, and we have communicated with loved ones of those incarcerated there. We have also managed to aid in getting needed services for DC inmates who needed medical and mental health services.
The CIC partnered with the Public Defender Service (PDS) to put on the first annual DC Prisoner and Reentry Symposium on March 10, 2017 at the University of the District of Columbia David A. Clarke School of Law. At this event, CIC and PDS convened criminal justice stakeholders, with presentations from over 20 experts in the fields of transition from prison, housing, employment, and supervised release. Leaders from Congress (Norton), DC Council (Allen, R. White), BOP, DOC, CSOSA, USPC addressed attendees as well.	This is the first large-scale event sponsored by CIC. Engaging experts in DC and from other jurisdictions has increased CIC's presence and access to these experts as it continues to do its inspection/monitoring work.	Service providers, advocates, agency leaders, and decision-makers got to learn from experts in how they are serving incarcerated and recently released DC residents. These stakeholders were also able to network, connect, and talk about how they can continue to work to serve this population.
CIC Holiday Card Initiative - The CIC printed over 4000 postcards with scenes from DC monuments (Big Chair, White House, Congress, Lincoln Memorial). The CIC then held several events where volunteers filled out pre-addressed postcards to DC residents who are incarcerated in Federal Bureau of Prisons facilities across the country.	This increased CIC's connection with incarcerated DC residents, some of whom had not previously heard of the CIC. CIC also sparked the interest of other agencies, including non-criminal justice agencies, who have since wanted to partner with or participate in future years' holiday card initiatives.	The goal of the card initiative was to let incarcerated DC residents know that people back in DC were thinking about them. The CIC reached this goal. Beyond that, it informed those who participated about the magnitude of the issue of DC not having a prison nearby and how difficult it is for other DC residents to stay connected to DC.
